THE MIGHTY ANGEL AND THE SMALL SCROLL

Revelation 10

The Daily Word from Laura Martin

Before the seventh trumpet was blown, John saw a mighty angel coming down from heaven surrounded by a cloud. When the angel cried out, seven thunders spoke, but a voice told John not to write it down. Then the angel announced there would no longer be an interval of time—no more delay, the wait is over. When the seventh angel blew the seventh trumpet, *then God's hidden plan, His mystery, will be completed.*

As you read these words and this vision of John, trust a time will come when the mystery of the Gospel and of Christ will be fully revealed. The time will come when the wait is over, and the plan is completed. Until then the Lord will provide you the strength and motivation to reveal truth. The Lord will provide grace to share about the mysteries of Christ and the fullness and the riches of His glory. The time to turn away from evil ways, to repent, and to seek the Lord *is now*. May any hesitation and pause in receiving Christ in your life cease, so when Christ does return, and His plan is completed—you are ready!

"There will no longer be an interval of time, but in the days of the sound of the seventh angel, when he will blow his trumpet, then God's hidden plan will be completed, as He announced to His servants the prophets."

- Revelation 10:6b-7

FURTHER SCRIPTURE

- Ephesians 3:8–9 "This grace was given to me—the least of all the saints—to proclaim to the Gentiles the incalculable riches of the Messiah, and to shed light for all about the administration of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things."
- 1 Corinthians 2:7 "On the contrary, we speak God's hidden wisdom in a mystery, a wisdom God predestined before the ages for our glory."
- Revelation 10:10–11 "Then I took the little scroll from the angel's hand and ate it. It was as sweet as honey in my mouth, but when I ate it, my stomach became bitter. And I was told, 'You must prophesy again about many peoples, nations, languages, and kings.'"

INTRO

We've now covered John's vision of six of seven angels who blow trumpets. Right before the trumpets blew, 144,000 people, twelve thousand from each tribe of Israel who were Jewish evangelists, were sealed by God so they would not be harmed by anything to come. Chapter 10 presents an interlude between the sixth and seventh trumpets. Remember there was also an interlude between the sixth and seventh seals.

So far six trumpets (angels) have revealed warnings about coming dangers: (1) fires; (2) polluted seas through blood; (3) contaminated fresh water; (4) the sun, moon, and stars damaged as nature changes; (5) the demonic invasion that torments those who don't have the seal for five months; and (6) 200,000 demons in the form of an army of locusts wage war. After the sixth trumpet, over half of the world's living population will be destroyed. According to Revelation 6:8, one-third of the population had already been destroyed, so at this point, over one-half of the world's population is gone. This leads into the pause of chapter 10.

TEACHING

Revelation 10:1–11: In verse 1 John saw another mighty angel coming down from heaven in a cloud with a rainbow over his head. MacArthur points out that "another" mighty angel identifies another created being, not Jesus, and describes the angel as "filled with splendor, greatness, and strength." 1

Look at the angels already presented in Revelation:

- Revelation 5:2 also proclaims the presence of "a mighty angel" asking who was worthy of opening the seals. The answer was Jesus.
- A third angel is described as having "great authority coming down from heaven" in Revelation 18:1.
- In Revelation 12:7, the angel there is identified as Michael.

About the angel in Revelation 10:1, *Nelson's Commentary* explains, "It is unlikely that this is Michael, who is referred to by name elsewhere (12:7, Dan 12:1), or Christ, since He is never called an angel in the NT." In Exodus 16:10, a cloud appeared, revealing God's glory. The language of Revelation 10:1 is similar.

The bottom line is that no one knows who this angel will be. The angel has a little scroll open in his hand, and he puts his right foot on the sea and his left foot on the land (v. 2). I wonder if this is the same scroll that was opened with the seven seals. If it were that scroll, then this angel is Christ. The angel cried out like a roaring lion and seven thunders spoke with their voices (v. 3).

John was ready to write down what the seven thunders said, but a voice from heaven told him not to (v. 4). Revelation 1:12 spoke of seven Spirits, but we cannot tell if these seven thunders are the same Spirits. *Nelson's Commentary* explains that the voice from heaven is different from the mighty angel and is probably Christ.³

The angel who stood with one foot on the sea and one on the land then raised his right hand to heaven and swore an oath to the Eternal God and Creator of all things. The angel swore, "There will no longer be an interval of time, but in the days of the sound of the seventh angel, when he will blow his trumpet, then God's hidden plan will be completed as He announced to His servants the prophets" (vv. 5–7). Nelson's Commentary explains, "After the sounding of the seventh trumpet, there will be NO more DELAY in the unfolding of events leading toward Christ's return."

When I read verse 7, I think this is exactly what we set out to do in Revive School. MacArthur says verse 7 explains, "The mystery [or hidden plan] is the final consummation of all things as God destroys sinners and establishes His righteous kingdom on earth. This mystery, though not fully revealed, was declared to God's prophets (Amos 3:7)."⁵

God's plan will then be complete. MacArthur points out that the Greek term for mystery or hidden means "to shut" or "to close." That means everything that has been shut or closed will now be open. (See Eph 3:4–5.)

The value of the oath is huge because it promises that all will come to fruition. Our key verse for all of Revive School is Matthew 5:17: "Don't assume that I came to destroy the Law or the Prophets. I did not come to destroy but to fulfill." This whole mystery—this whole plan—will come to fruition.

The voice from heaven spoke again and told John to take the scroll from the angel's hand. John did as he was instructed, and the angel then told John to eat the scroll that would be bitter in his stomach (bitter to swallow) but sweet as honey in his mouth (vv. 8–9).

The scroll shows the contradiction of what is to come. What is to come will not be good because people will be hurt in the process, but it will be good because of the fulfillment of God's plan. God's Word is described as bread (Matt 4:4), as milk (1 Pet 2:2), as a delight (Jer 15:16), as meat by the Apostle Paul, and as honey in Psalms. In Ezekiel 2:9, the scroll was fed to Ezekiel.

John took the scroll and ate it. It was sweet like honey in his mouth but bitter in his stomach (v. 10). Then he was told he "must prophesy again about many peoples, nations, languages, and kings" (v. 11).

CLOSING

Sometimes when the Word of God is released, people don't like it because it tastes bitter. If you don't believe Jesus died on the Cross for your sins and that He is coming back, then you are going to hell. That's a bitter message for unbelievers. Unbelievers will face eternal destruction.

But if you believe Jesus died on the Cross and came back to life to be your Lord and Savior, then you can have hope eternal in this entire process.

The oath is that everything we've talked about through our entire study of the Bible is coming to fruition. We haven't even gotten to the seventh scroll yet when all this is released. John was given a message of warning to tell everyone.

3.	Read Revelation 10:7. What do you think this means? What is the mystery of God? Will all Bible prophecy be fulfilled at this time?
4.	The angel instructed John to eat the "little book." Where else in Scripture do you see this (Ezekiel 2:8–9; 3:1-3)? What do you think Revelation 10:9 means? Why is the little book sweet tasting to his mouth but sour to his stomach?
5.	What did the Holy Spirit highlight to you in Revelation 10 through the reading or the teaching?
